

How to read a course code The first five characters of the code are standard and recognized across Ontario, while the sixth character is always school-specific. Let's learn how to read a course code, using this example: **ENG3CR**

<p><u>ENG</u></p> <p>Course title</p> <p>The first three characters of the course code (ENG in this example) refers to the name of the course. ENG3CR is an English course.</p> <p>Ex- MTH - Math SNC - Science</p>	<p><u>3</u></p> <p>Grade</p> <p>The fourth character (4 in this example) refers to the grade of the course.</p> <p>1=Grade 9 2=Grade 10 3=Grade 11 4=Grade 12</p> <p>ENG3C is a Grade 11 English course.</p>	<p><u>C</u></p> <p>Course type</p> <p>The fifth character (U in this example) refers to the type of course.</p> <p>In Grades 9: W or D = destreamed open for all learners O = open (preparation for further study) L = Locally developed (preparation for workplace)</p> <p>In Grade 10: D = academic (preparation for Gr. 11 & 12 university courses) P = applied (preparation for Gr. 11 & 12 college courses) O = open (preparation for further study) L = Locally developed (preparation for workplace)</p> <p>In Grade 11 & Grade 12: U = university preparation M = university/college preparation C = college preparation E = workplace preparation O = open; may not be designed for university or college requirements</p>	<p><u>R</u></p> <p>Place holder or used for specialty courses.</p> <p>R-Regular F= Female M=Male I=Immersion</p>
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
